Upcoming Events:

- **Volunteer work party** scheduled for Saturday June 11th at 10AM. This event is a collaboration volunteer project with McKenzie River Trust. Please join us at Oregon Dunes Day Use Area. This volunteer weed pull will begin at 10 AM and end at noon with a guided hike to follow. Please bring gloves. A shovel and small hand saw work well for the larger scotch broom. Limited tools will be provided. Bring water and good hiking shoes. This work takes place on the sand. Local dune expert Dina Pavlis will be giving a guided hike after the weed pull event, all participants are welcome to join and learn about the Oregon Dunes. Due to limited tool supply please register for this event at [McKenzie River Trust](#). Bring snacks and/or lunch. Lunch is not provided.
- **Directions:** Coming from the North head south on HWY 101 for about 11.5 miles, turn right into Oregon Dunes Day Use Area. Coming from the South, head north on HWY 101 for 11.5 miles and turn left into Oregon Dunes Day Use Area.
- **Volunteer work party** scheduled for Friday, June 17th at John Dellenback Trail. We will meet in the main parking area at 10 AM and hike and pull scotch broom along the western dune area until noon. Limited tools will be provided. Bring water and good hiking shoes. This work takes place on the sand. Registration is not required for this event.
- **Directions:** John Dellenback Dunes are located just west of Lakeside.

Working Group Updates

Communications, Outreach, & Education-

The ODRC had the great pleasure of working with Northwest Youth Corps (NYC). The Northwest Youth Corps offers education and job-training to help youth and young adults from diverse backgrounds. With this training and education young adults develop the skills they need to lead full and productive lives, while gaining valuable work experience.

The NYC crew consisted of a small group of six young adults. The team worked for four days North of Florence and exceeded all expectations. They cut some very large scotch broom that was in full bloom. Thanks to the crew those cut broom will not be dispersing seeds this year. The crew did a great job of digging below to the root system of the scotch broom. Digging and cutting as low as possible is an important part when cutting down large scotch broom. It's recommended to dig around the base of the large scotch broom and then cut as low as possible prevent future re-sprouting of the plant. See photos below for an idea on how large these bases and roots are.



Above: A large scotch broom was cut into pieces to get to the base. Once the base of the scotch broom is exposed, then digging and removing as much of the plant is essential to prevent re-sprouting.

We hope you all enjoy this 7-minute video that dives deep into the the dune's history, and the origins of the ODRC. We encourage everyone to share this video broadly!


