Field Trip with Senator Merkley's Chief of Staff

Several members of the ODRC were able to share our love of the dunes with a very special guest earlier this month. Mike Zamore, the Chief of Staff to Senator Jeff Merkley, was in Oregon for a week and made a stop on the dunes. He had never seen the dunes before, and even though it was a bit rainy, we were able to explain the changes in the dunes at the Day Use Area and briefly drive out in the South Jetty area to see the invasive beach grasses up close. We are beginning to plan a full-day field trip for next summer, during which we hope to bring together elected officials from



local, county, state, and federal levels to learn about the loss of the dunes and our efforts to save them. Stay tuned for more!

Working Group Updates

<u>Communications & Outreach</u> - We had a table at the Cape Perpetua Land-Sea Symposium in Yachats this month, where we met other great organizations doing work along the Oregon coast, and talked to dozens of people about the dunes. Also, mark your calendars for the <u>National Geographic Live</u> speaker series in Eugene. December 12, January 29, and February 26. We'll have a table out in the lobby at each of these exciting presentations.

Volunteering - Our work parties have continued as long as the weather cooperates. 12 volunteers joined us at Heceta Dunes to remove Scotch broom on November 3rd. Last Friday, 13 volunteers, including 3 first-timers, helped pull Scotch broom from the Lagoon Campground and Trail, and we made significant progress. We should be able to finish most of this site with a good turnout at our next event. The next work party will be on Friday, November 30th, weather-permitting. See our events page for full details.

<u>Education</u> - The education working group is looking into the production of a video or series of short clips that will tell the story of the Oregon dunes. These videos can be shown during public presentations, to school groups, on our website, and shared on social media! We will also be developing a children's activity book, and have recruited a new volunteer member, a retired school teacher from Florence, who will be helping create those lessons.

<u>Monitoring</u> - The monitoring group has set its next meeting for November 29th in Corvallis. We will be discussing how to best track our restoration efforts and what data we will need to collect. Did you Know? - There are mushrooms growing in the dunes!

Did you know that the Oregon dunes are a great place to forage for mushrooms? The mosaic of different habitats found in the dunes allows for a surprising variety of mushrooms to grow. Individuals are allowed to collect most species of mushrooms, up to one gallon, without a permit. Collecting more than one gallon, collecting for sale or trade, and collecting matsutake mushrooms requires a permit.
