Education Programs Continue with ECO Partnership in 2019

For more than twenty years, Jim Grano has led field-based experiences for local schools. First as a teacher and continuing as a volunteer for three school districts after retirement, Jim developed the Stream Team program and has engaged thousands of students from Florence, Mapleton and Reedsport. Field trips to the dunes are just one of the amazing activities Jim has coordinated over the years. As Jim steps down from his role, the nonprofit organization Ecology in Classrooms and Outdoors (ECO) is stepping in to continue his programs in both the classroom and the field!

According to Jim, "with Stream Team field experiences, our youth become informed stewards, learning to value the watershed they live in as they participate hands-on with its restoration".

Working Group Updates

<u>Communications & Outreach</u> - We have given presentations this past month to the Reedsport Rotary Club, Many Rivers Group of the Sierra Club (Eugene chapter), and the Coos County Board of Commissioners. Thanks to all of these groups for having us!

We were also able to talk to more than 100 people about the dunes at the first of the <u>National Geographic Live</u> speaker series in Eugene. We will have an educational table at the next two talks as well, on January 29th and February 26th. You can use code OREGONDUNES20 to recieve 20% off the standard ticket price.

<u>Volunteering</u> - The last work party for 2018 was held the first week of December. Nine volunteers braved the cold to pull Scotch broom at the Lagoon Campground. We've worked at that site several times and have now removed most of the broom. Good work everyone!!

During January and February, our work parties will happen less frequently due to weather. Please fill out our volunteer <u>contact form</u> online to stay updated.

<u>Education</u> - As mentioned above, we're excited to strengthen our educational programs with the help of Ecology in Classrooms and Outdoors in 2019. We will also continue to work over the winter developing a children's activity book.

Monitoring - The monitoring group met in late November to discuss what strategies we will pursue in 2019. Ideas being discussed include developing protocols for photo-point monitoring, recruiting and training volunteers, and new aerial photography. The group will have a more concrete proposal developed before the February ODRC meeting.

Funding - The funding group met in early December to review what requests our other working groups had submitted. Team members then divided themselves into focus areas and are now identifying which grants we will be pursuing in 2019.

<u>Cooperative Weed Management Area (CWMA)</u> - THE CWMA group is finalizing a grant application that will fund removal of gorse from multiple locations within the dunes.

The afternoon of the February 15th ODRC meeting will be reserved for working groups to get together. Feel free to join a working group if any of these projects interest you!


Did you Know? - Stories in Stone
